The bird was associated closely with CINNAMON TEALS. IT APPEARED TO BE THE SAME SIZE AS THE TEALS. The male duck was very striking with the long white eyebrows very conspicuous against the reddish brown head.

Description (continued):

The brown front part of the body contrasted sharply with the light gray sides of the body. The long body feathers drooping down over the rear of the body were also very conspicuous. In flight the white bordering the speculum were quite obvious.

THE HEAD AND NECK WERE A UNIFORM RUSTY/BROWN COLOR WITH VERY  
FINE, ALMOST NOT NOTICEABLE, BLACK FLECKS.

EYES &amp; LORES (supercilium, eye-ring, eye-stripe, color, etc.):

THIS BIRD WAS A TYPICAL MALE WITH A VERY BROAD ALL WHITESUPERCILIUM / "EYEBROW" THAT CURVED DOWN THE NECK AND TAPERED OFF.LOWER & UPPER MANDIBLES (color & shape): THE BILL WAS A  
UNIFORM BLACKISH GREY.LEGS & FEET: NOT SEEN.UPPERPARTS (nape, back, rump, uppertail coverts, etc.): THE BIRD'S BACK GREW  
LIGHTER ~~AS~~ THE CLOSER THE FEATHERS WERE TO THE TAIL. (FRONT TO BACK)  
THE WERE MORE GRAY TOWARD THE MID-BACK WERE THE LONG FINGER-LIKE FEATHERS  
STARTED TO PROTRUDE.  + DID NOT MAKE NOTE OF  
THE RUMP ~~FEATHERS~~ OR TAIL FEATHER AREA.

UNDERPARTS (chin, throat, belly, sides, flanks, crissum, etc.):

THE CHIN WAS LIKE THE REST OF THE HEAD (COLORWISE) + DID NOT SEE  
THE BELLY. THE SIDES (SEE ABOVE) HAD A "PANEL" BORDERED WITH  
WHITE. INSIDE THE WHITE BORDERS WAS A SLIGHTLY STRIPED (VERTICLE)  
AREA.

WINGS (color, length, shape, bars, coverts, etc.):

I ONLY SAW THE WINGS ONCE AS IT FLOWED FROM THE FEEDS OUT TO MORE OPEN  
WATER. THE WING PATTERN WAS VERY SIMILAR TO THAT OF THE TEAL (CINNAMON).  
THE PRIMARIES WERE MAYBE A LITTLE LIGHTER GREY ON THE TOP SIDE.

VOCALIZATION (call/song, method of delivery, i.e., from perch, in flight):

HABITAT: POND

ELIMINATION OF SIMILARLY APPEARING SPECIES:

THE ONLY POSSIBLE SIMILAR SPECIES WOULD BE A BLUE WING  
TEAL. THE <sup>WHITE</sup> ~~RED~~ ON A TEAL'S HEAD IS IN THE FRONT OF THE FACE THOUGH.  
A GARGANAY IS PRETTY MUCH UNLIKE ANY OTHER DUCK FOUND IN OUR  
AREA.

PRIOR EXPERIENCE WITH THIS AND SIMILARLY APPEARING SPECIES:

NONE WITH THE GARGANAY. BLUE WING TEAL I HAVE OBSERVED  
QUITE EXTENSIVELY, IN THE SPRING ESPECIALLY.
