In May, many birders heard Black Rails at this sight.

Light conditions:

excellent.

Optical equipment:

10X40 Bauch & Lomb Binoculars.

Distance from bird:

2-30 yards.

Describe the bird's behavior:

The bird called from the marsh floor. It walked within two feet of us. I walked toward where I believed the bird was and the bird flew, giving us good flight views.

Describe the bird:

We only saw the bird in flight. The size was about 6 inches. The overall shape was typical rail shaped. The plumage was an adult. The color pattern follows: the whole bird was black, except for the chestnut patch on the nape. This field mark was seen by both Bob and I, and know other small black rail has a chestnut patch on the nape. I identified the bird by the small black rail shape, by the chestnut colored patch on the nape, and by the bird's "ki ki doo" call/song and the bird's "growl sounds".

Describe the bird's song and call if heard:

The bird gave a "ki ki doo" call/song many times. The bird also gave a "growl" sound many times.

Describe the habitat in which you observed the bird:

The bird was observed in a marsh with cattails and reeds in Southeastern Colorado.

How did you eliminate similarly appearing species:

Sora: This species is larger than Black Rail and does not have the chestnut patch on the nape like Black Rails do.

Other Rails: These species are all larger and not black.

No other bird makes a ki ki doo sound like Black Rails do.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species:

I have seen one bird previously at this site on May 18, 1991. I have heard Black Rails at Bent's Old Fort Marsh in 1991, 1992, 1994, 1995 and at the Fort Lyon Area marshes in 1994 and 1995. On May 12, 1995 Van Truan and I heard 16 different Black Rails these two marshes, being my largest total in one night in Colorado.

Describe the bird's behavior:

The bird was first heard about 25 yards off the road in the marsh. When we played our tape the bird walked within 3 feet. We never saw the bird. It made it's ki ki doo call/song several times.

Describe the bird:

We only heard this bird. It gave it's typical ki ki doo call/song several times, when we were trying to see it.

Describe the bird's song and call if heard:

The bird gave a ki ki doo call/song several times.

Describe the habitat in which you observed the bird:

The bird was found in a marsh with cattails and reed in Southeastern Colorado.

How did you eliminate similarly appearing species:

No other bird sounds like a Black Rail's ki ki doo.

What is you prior experience with this and similarly appearing species:

I have seen two in Colorado on May 18, 1991 and June 29, 1995 at Bent's Old Fort Marsh. I have heard at least 16 differnt birds on May 12, 1995 in Otero & Bent Counties. On May 7, 1994 I heard six birds at the same locations as on May 12, 1995. Also I have heard Black Rails in Colorado in 1992.
