BIRD TOOK OFF AND FLEW UP AND DIRECTLY AWAY FROM ME SO THAT  
ONLY THE BACK OF THE BIRD WAS WELL SEEN. THE BIRD WAS ABOUT THE  
LENGTH OF A STELLER'S JAY (ALSO IN AREA), BUT WAS MUCH BROADER AND CHUNKIER.

Description (continued):

THE BACK OF THE HEAD WAS MOSTLY BLACK. THE UPPER BACK HAD STRIPES OF BLACK AND RUST. THE RUST WAS QUITE BRIGHT, BRIGHTER THAN ON SNIFE. THE WINGS WERE BROAD AND MOSTLY RUST/BROWN. THE TAIL WAS VERY SHORT, BRIGHT RED AT THE BASE, THEN BLACK AND TIPPED WITH WHITE. THE BILL WAS LONG AND THIN. THE BIRD IN FLIGHT MADE A WHISTLING NOISE FROM ITS WINGS - SOUNDED HIGHER PITCHED TO ME THAN IN COMMON SNIFE.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery, (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration):

NO SONG OR CALL.

Describe the general and specific habitat in which you observed the bird:

RIPARIAN AREA ALONG STREAM, SPECIFICALLY HEAVY WILLOW UNDER BRUSH.

How did you eliminate similarly appearing species?

COMMON SNIFE - SHAPE OF BIRD, VERY CHUNKY, WIDE HEAD, APPEARED ALMOST NOT TO HAVE A NECK. BLACK & RUST PATTERN ON THE BACK AND HEAD.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species?

HAVE OBSERVED A FEW WOODCOCKS IN EAST ON THREE SEPARATE OCCASIONS.  
VERY FAMILIAR WITH COMMON SNIFE
