

Describe the general and specific habitat in which the bird(s) occurred: In sage and low brush near trees near the lake.		
Describe the bird's behavior (flying, feeding, habits, behaviors used in identifying the Species or in supporting the identification): Bird was feeding near the tops of the low brush (about 4-5 ft). It would hover at one location for a short time and then move about 10-15 feet and repeat the process until it flew into the trees by the lake.		
Describe the bird in detail. This is the most important part of this report. Include the overall size and shape and how you placed the bird in the general group that you did. (Fill out this portion even if photographs are submitted; you may attach additional sheets, drawings, field sketches or copy field notes): This was a very large hummingbird with slow wing beats. The bill was very long and about 1 and 1/4 to 1 and 1/2 the depth of the head. The bill was black and slightly decurved. The back was dark green and the chest/belly was a mottled gray. The sides seemed to be lightly washed with greenish color. There was a very small white spot behind the eye and no other markings on the head except that the throat was lighter gray to whitish compared to the chest. The tail was dark green that faded to black near the tips. The outer two or three rectrices had very small white tips. These were very hard to see and took repeated views to confirm these markings.		
Describe bird's call or song: Not heard		
Discuss similar species and how you eliminated them: The blue-throated hummingbird is the only other likely hummingbird that is large with slow wingbeats. The blue-throated has distinctive white markings by the bill and behind the eye which this bird did not have. Also, belly of blue-throated is darker and more uniformly gray. Also, tail is black with much larger white tips to the outer feathers.		
What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species? I have seen both species many times in southeast Arizona.		
List books, guides, recordings or other sources consulted and how this influenced your identification (during and after observation): I consulted Sibley, Peterson and NGS after observing the bird. I was nearly certain that the bird was a female magnificent, because of the lack of the white head markings. Also, I knew that tails were different, but I didn't recall the details in the field.
