The Brant flew in with a small group of Canada Geese (*Branta canadensis*) just prior to sunset. Overall body size was slightly smaller than several Lesser Canada Geese (*B. c. parvipes*) in immediate proximity. It had a medium-length, dark bill. The upperparts were sooty-black, except for a large, white (streaked with some black) triangle-shaped patch on either side of its neck and white tipping to the wing coverts. The neck, chest, were also blackish extending down to its belly, but becoming more diffuse with white as it neared the lower belly. The vent area was pure white extending up its flanks and onto the rump (white U-shaped rump seen in flight). The outer tail feathers were black. The sides had large black and white mottled patches. The eyes were dark. I did not note leg color.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration): None heard.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly-appearing species? I have seen hundreds of Black Brant while living in northern California.

Light conditions: poor light with sun already set behind me.

Optical equipment used: Zeiss 7x42 binoculars
