Describe the general and specific habitats in which the bird(s) occurred: Directly over the lake

Describe the bird's (birds') behaviors, particularly behaviors that were used in supporting the identification, e.g., flying, feeding, habits: Flying over a lake, quick wingbeats and rocking motion, loud twittering.

It was short-tailed, cigar-shaped body and long, pointed wings. The typical "flying cigar". It was twittering and chattering as a chimney swift, which the observers as a group had heard many times. The bird was dark underneath – no sign of white or pale color on the throat or breast.

Describe the bird's (birds') call(s) and/or song(s), if noted: loud twittering and chirping, high and rapid.

**SIMILAR SPECIES – This is another critical part of your report.** Please discuss how you eliminated similar species from consideration: The bird was too small and short-tailed for a black swift and the wings were narrower. It did not have any visible white underneath or on the sides of rump like a white-throated swift. It was not pale on the breast as a Vaux's swift. The bird's wings were more long and narrow than a swallow, tail short and no notch in tail.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species? Have spent most of my birding years in eastern KS and western MO – and am very familiar with the sound, shape and activity of chimney swifts. The same with the other birders from OK.
