Describe the general and specific habitat in which the bird(s) occurred: Artificial reservoir behind flood control dam.

Describe the bird's behavior (flying, feeding, habits, behaviors used in identifying the Species or in supporting the identification): The BLKI was actively swimming around with a loose group of about 6 Bonaparte's Gulls and a Herring Gull.

I first noticed this bird as I was looking through a group of about 6 Bonaparte's Gulls swimming around about 75 yards off the Marina Sand Spit at Chatfield. Was first struck me was that there was another gull with a spot behind the eye but that it was noticeably larger than the BOGUs. Closer inspection revealed a nearly black nape and a diagonal dark line running along the middle of the wing, which further separated the bird from its companion BOGUs. The black primaries, black medium-long bill, and slight vertical elongation of the eye spot completed the match with what Sibley calls a Juvenile/1st Winter Black-legged Kittiwake.

Describe bird's call or song: Not heard.

Discuss similar species and how you eliminated them: As mentioned above and seen in the photographs, size and the amount of black on the nape and center of the wing eliminated Bonaparte's Gull. A 1st winter Red-legged Kittiwake should have a more uniform, darker gray back and a lighter, thinner nape coloration. Other small gulls with eye-spots like a 1st winter Ross's or Sabine's Gull can be eliminated on the basis of size. A 1st winter Black-headed Gull should have darkness above the eye as well, along with some thin white lines in the primaries, as well as a lack of a dark nape.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species? This is the second immature BLKI I've seen in Colorado. I've seen dozens of Bonaparte's Gulls this fall, including at least 15 that afternoon at Chatfield.

List books, guides, recordings or other sources consulted and how this influenced your identification (during and after observation): While viewing the bird and later at home I consulted The Sibley Guide To Birds. Once home, I also consulted Seabirds of the World, by Jim Enticott and David Tipling, and the National Geographic Field Guide to the Birds of North America, 3rd ed.
